Tips 'n Techniques

Propane Torch Safety

Via the Bearhawk Yahoo mail-list:

Writes Paul: I was working in the shop today, sweating copper fittings for the air lines in my shop. I'm using one of those Surefire click-type torches that screw on top of a propane canister. I had it sitting upright. With the torch head on the canister, it's kind of tippy that way. Well, I happened to bump it and **it fell over**, **and it hit just in the right spot to click the torch and the flame was going for a few seconds**. I had been using that torch for years and have knocked it over that way I don't know how many times but it never ignited. Luckily, it was on the shop floor and nothing caught on fire. I had it on my bench the last few days as I was working, but I never laid it over or engaged the lock when I left. It wouldn't have taken much to knock it over (earthquake?) and start a fire in the shop while I was sleeping or gone chasing parts. I always store it apart, but this taught me a good lesson while using it. Never too old to learn...

Replies Jim: Did you know that **the torch will screw onto the larger diameter green camping cylinders**? They are way more stable. I don't even bother with the narrow blue ones anymore because they are just too tippy. You can also get a base plate for the camp bottles that make it almost impossible to tip over.

Dave Lowry's Lancair Legacy

First up, chapter business -

Of the 18-20 people attending, there were a couple new members and guests. One new member, Ed, traveled from Vancouver to the meeting. He's working on ribs and spars for his -7A project. Greg is in Beaverton now, up from K-Falls. He's restarted his flying lessons and considering an RV-8 project.

For member milestones, Jim Maddox passed his airworthiness inspection and Dan Benua took his first flight in his RV-10.

Randy described the plans for our new Desser wheel balancer, to be placed at the chapter project hangar.

He also took a straw-poll asking how many members

would take advantage of a chapter-sponsored online forum for hooking members with questions up with local folks that have experience in that area. There were questions as to what it could do that Doug Reeves' site doesn't, namely hook folks up with *local* experts and cover local events (and my thought as one of the BOOTs —cover non-RV questions.) Response was good, with pretty much everyone signaling they'd use the facility as it was explained.

And next up, Dave Lowry took over -

This was our second visit to Dave's project, reprising our visit about a year and a half ago. Dave's been working on his Lancair Legacy since March of 2001. Some of his initial work, attaching the fuse halves was done at the Lancair build shop. The shop will work with builders as long as they want (at \$4k / wk) but they're set up to do

the work one way, so if you want to change things it's not so good of a fit. Dave did a minimum of work there.

Dave emphasizes he really enjoys the building, solving problems and the satisfaction of seeing the details come together. He readily admits there might not be much immediately visible progress since our last look, but indeed much has been accomplished attaching bits to the engine and firewall. The problems and frustrations have been of the sort, like bolting something to the firewall, then moving to next component and finding it wants to overlap the first by a 1/4". Certainly Lancair has a plan for the firewall setup, but Dave has made enough alterations that he's pretty much on his own getting things placed.

Dave says the Lancair community is smaller than the RV clan, but that just forces them to hold tighter and there is good support from his fellow builders. There's no stepby-step assembly manual, but like any aircraft project, fitting the firewall piercings and firewall forward components goes pretty much in a standard order: engine controls first, then heat vents and last wiring -- that is, the order of least to most flexible conduits. And sometimes, he adds, the components supplied by Lancair simply aren't completely thought out, like the exhaust hangers than just won't work around their heat-muff. So he does what homebuilders do, asks around for alternate solutions and makes adjustments.

Board Meeting Highlights

Your Chapter 105 Board

Attending this evening (21feb08) were Randy Lervold, Dunstan Fandel, Len Kauffman, Benton Holzwarth, ralph Schildknecht, Jim Mitchell, Joe Miller, Rion Bourgeois, Tom Louris, Donna Lervold, Jenny Hickman, MikeMcGee and Dick VanGrunsven.

The meeting was called to order a few minutes after 7:00 PM at McMenamin's Greenway pub on Scholls Ferry Rd, Tigard, OR, with a moment to review the January minutes for approval. The January minutes were approved after review.

• Hangar Update (Rion): Jim Maddox has passed his inspection and will be moving out of the chapter's project hangar G-3. Neil Arney has arranged to move into G-3.

Steve Rosenstock is shopping for and installing antennas to add internet in chapter hangar. The Stark's OK'd us tapping into their airpark network, and the antennas are to avoid stringing wire from the main hangar down to our chapter space. (Funds were approved at a previous board meeting.) Rion is donating a computer to use in G1.

A motion-sensor patio light has been installed outside the chapter project hangar, G-1.

• Breakfast Ops (Len): The task instructions are working well, but will take a couple a three more cycles to iron out the details. Plans are to place station instructions near the station, e.g. How to make coffee on wall by coffee makers, etc. Len has also been shopping for plastic holders and lanyards for the task lists. He has prices for two grades of holders. \$100 was approved for Len to shop for materials.

Recognizing the long years of service Joe and Char have put in at our breakfast operation (they were in the original crew, 14 years ago) Len is stepping up to fill the crew chief role, to allow Joe and Char to work more as they want to rather than feeling obligated to attending every session from beginning to end. A huge "thanks" to owed to Joe and Char for their efforts all these years. The breakfast operation, aside from being a terrific social success, has funded many of our chapter activities and they were largely responsible for our success all these years.

• A suggestion came in to the board from a member, suggesting some changes to allow diners to mingle more freely and not hold positions waiting in line for service. The suggestion was to issue number-tickets as folks pay then call

them up by number group. Then they're free to mingle anywhere until their number is called.

Discussion fell into a couple areas: concern over anything that adds to the volunteer's work; that waiting folks will sit at tables tying up space for those that already have their plates in hand. In any case, it seems that it's only really necessary in the busier months and some of us are willing to try it. One plan is to place a white-board (we have one in G-1) where everyone can see it and just jot the call-up numbers there. Alternate ideas will be considered if anyone has any.

• Raffles: There was also a suggestion to operate a 50/50 raffle at the breakfasts as a fun/social thing. Problems with running it at the breakfasts are that everyone has to stick around until the drawing. There was a suggestion to run raffles at the general meetings, perhaps with the 'club' half going to the host, but also concern that that would compete with the host's donation jug. Also, as always, guarding against more work for volunteers.

• Espresso: The board, and Mike McGee in particular, has looked into starting an Espresso stand operation at the breakfasts. There has been requests for 'good' coffee from time to time. Setting up a machine would require more electricity to be plumbed into the hangar, 3-4 trained baristas to run a computerized machine (a \$2500-3000 initial cash outlay) Mike estimated about 10 months to repay the purchase, with some assumptions about how many cups per month and at a Starbucks sort of price. Alternative suggestion was to put in a couple of 'deluxe' home espresso machines and let folks make their own. In the end we decided to table the idea for now.

• Events: B-17 planning (Rion/Dunstan): Insurance has been obtained. The Port of Portland has given us a waiver of landing fees. The Porta-Potties have been ordered. Everything is coming together. Dunstan will handle media and volunteer sign-ups.

Last year, Ch 12 covered the event, and even broadcast live from the B-17 for their morning segment. This year we've also signed up as a Portland Rose Festival sanctioned event. For the fee (half picked up EAA Nat'l) we get to apply their logo to our advertising and will also be listed in all of their advertising and schedules.

Dunstan also requested 'staff' tee-shirts be obtained so guests would be able to tell who to ask questions and get assistance from. That was approved at our Jan meeting.

• Young Eagles: Ron is planning a 'season kick-off' pilot

briefing, to refresh procedures for past pilots and to try to draw in new pilots. Special chapter "Young Eagle Pilot" hats have been ordered and will be given to our YE pilots.

• New tools: A static wheel balancer has been purchased. It'll be installed in the chapter project hangar for use by everyone. One of our spark-plug cleaners will also be permanently placed there with it. Randy will write up a short piece for the newsletter.

A bending brake was donated to the chapter when Van's Aircraft retired it. It's large enough that we're looking for alternative places to store it; Rion will ask the Starks if they would store it in one of their hangars. Also, we believe someone removed the toe piece from it, to radius for bending aluminum, but we're not sure now who might have done it. [Update following the meeting: The original toepiece was located, nothing nefarious, it was removed when the brake was in use at Van's, and had been set aside out of sight at our hangar. We're now looking to modify this one, or fabricate another, suitable (radiused) for bending aluminum.]

• Forum SW: Randy brought up discussion of installing forum software on the chapter website at the January meeting. It was brought up again for discussion at the Feb meeting, with Randy again explaining the utility (vs. mail lists) to the folks that missed it at the Jan meeting. He also related that a straw-poll taken at the Feb general meeting met with wide support. The board authorized Randy to spend \$160 for his choice system that he is willing to setup. Beyond that, it will take active support by our Tech-Counselors and members to help it attain critical mass.

• Oxygen refill system: There was discussion, and even offer of a gas manifold from a member that ran a dive-shop, around the chapter setting up to refill breathing-oxygen bottles. In the end, liability and lack of insurability have killed the idea. Too bad, there was a fair amount of interest in the idea. One fallback is Aurora Aviation, filling bottles for \$29 a pop.

• **Bogardus Trust business:** The Chapter 105 board appoints the board of the Bogardus trust and Chapter 105 presidents are normally appointed to terms on that board. Our president Randy's current term is expiring at the end of 2008. Rion proposed that Randy be appointed to another four-year term following the current term. That was approved by the 105 board.

With all business covered, the meeting was adjourned at 8:05.


