NOTAM (Fly-Ins PLEASE READ!)


Parkside is a "nonstandard", private airport so we need to be extra careful for safety's sake and to keep the neighbors happy. If you're never flown into a field like this, it's probably not a good first time. If you are OK going into Flying M, Woodland, Vernonia, or Pacific City you should be fine, but please use your best judgment. If in doubt, bring your

CFI, there'll be plenty of food.

Airport is 250' elev. 2100' strip, paved with grass strip on the north side of paved strip. Runway is not numbered, so we call it "...to the West" and "...to the east." Pattern is on the south.

Goheen airport is a couple of miles to the west, so try not to cross their runway centerline as you turn base if landing to the east. Avoid flying over houses to the North. Trees both ends, but they are less of a factor landing to the east. Landing to the east is generally the preferred approach, even in a slight tailwind. Landing to the west should only be done if there is a strong west wind, and requires a very low approach over the trees. Watch for turbulence on short final, use short-field technique and minimum approach speed. If you're not down in the first third, go around.

Frequency is 122.9; we'll have someone on a handheld radio for traffic advisories. No lights, so it is preferred to



depart before dark. Sunset is at 9:00, so we have lots of time. All departures are to the west. For FAA airport data go to www.airnav.com/airport/WA87.



Youth Flight Training Scholarships – Apply Now!

The board of trustees of the George and Lillian Bogardus Memorial Trust Fund recently awarded a grant of \$4,000 to EAA Chapter 105 to be utilized for flight training scholarships for youth. The trustees are Dick VanGrunsven, Rion Bourgeois, Brent Anderson, Benton Holzwarth, Jim Mitchell, and Ron Singh.

There will be 4 scholarships awarded. Each scholarship will consist of 10 Hours of Flight Training in a Cessna 150 with an instructor through Starks Twin Oaks Airpark, or \$1,000 for aircraft rental for flight training purposes.

RULES:

- 1. Applicant must be between the ages of 16 through 21. The applicant may be 15, but must turn 16 in calendar year 2010.
- 2. The scholarship is non-transferable and must be utilized in calendar year 2010.
- 3. The scholarship may be utilized towards any level of flight training (beginning student through advanced ratings).
- 4. Children and/or grandchildren of chapter directors, Bogardus trustees, and scholarship selection panel members are not eligible.

TO APPLY:

Submit an application packet (via email in PDF format) to ron.singh@eaa105.org by Sunday, June 20, 2010. This packet must contain:

- 1. Biography and contact information.
- 2. 1 2 page narrative describing applicant's interest, experience, and future plans in aviation.
- 3. 3 letters of recommendation (2 must be from other than family members).
- 4. Parental approval and signature (if under 18 years of age).

SELECTION:

A 4 person selection panel consisting of EAA Chapter 105 members will select up to 10 candidates from the submittals received for interviews to be held on June 26th, 2010 at the EAA Chapter 105 Hangar.

The selection panel will make their decisions based on the interviews and the scholarships will be awarded by June 30th, 2010.

topic. Bob selected departure stalls for his presentation. His admonition was to always have a plan for what you'll do if and when (or just WHEN) your engine quits on departure. At what altitude and runway relation does your plan change from 'land straight ahead' to 'attempt a return to the runway.' What other factors go into the decision? To drive home the lesson, Bob showed a video, a graphic Australian newscast, of a tragic mishandling of a departure engine-out that resulted in a stall/spin when the pilot (appeared to) attempted a return to the runway, made more tragic by the presence of

a wing-walker along for the ride. He offered a final admonition to always fly coordinated, so at the least, the departure stall may be recoverable rather than resulting in a snap-roll.

Gus Fennell was our Van's-staff host for the evening, explaining that Ken Krueger was currently at the Friedrichshafen airshow (www.aero-expo.com/) showing the company's products, and opened with a recap of the current state of our local kit airplane source. He said not much had actually changed over the previous year. There is a new 'riveting station' for building RV-12 spars; also a large belt sander has been added to the equipment

list as well as another welding station. More of the kit component welding is done in-house now. After a slow time, they're now running a second shift at the punchpresses again. The current staff totals 65, there were a few layoffs over the preceeding year but most have been called back.

For stats, there have been 375 'starts' of -12 kits in two years and first-flights (for all types) number about 1-1/2 a day -- 500 a year!

He also reported on the progress of the Teen-Flight crew. The group of 12, on average, has now invested 25 Saturdays of roughly five hour sessions. Their progress speaks for itself and the workmanship that I saw appeared very professionally done.

He also said about 30% of their kits are delivered overseas, with Brazil being an especially hot destination. That country's regulations allow 'build to order' and many buyers there opt for an RV. That country now has about 250 flying RVs and is probably in second place, behind the US for flying examples.

From there we broke up into groups for guided tours of the operation and the Teen Flight work area, or just found our own way around.


